Report on works this year

Clive Manvell gave a report on the activities for the year which are all documented on the web site.

As well as regular maintenance of the local water ways and ditches there was a lot of work in managing Himalayan Balsam which is a non-native Invasive species. Clive reported that there does seem to be a reduced amount this year thanks to a lot of work in previous years, it does spread very quickly and so does need constant attention.

This year the Emergency response team applied for a grant from Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks for a permanent shed and equipment. This is to be used by the Emergency response team, the Community Woodland Group and the Hanneys Flood Group. The application was successful and the team of Clive Manvell, David Stubbington and Keith Chisholm worked very hard in managing this project. A hard standing has been built, the shed installed and electrical power connected. The next stage is to purchase equipment and install shelving. The Flood Group equipment will be stored in this new shed and the existing horse box trailer replaced with a smaller, lockable, trailer that can be stored inside the shed.

The general work on the streams and ditches continues with occasionally large fallen trees to be cut up and removed. Typically, 8-16 people will-attend and although there is a core team some members will come on an occasional basis. This works very well but more help would always be appreciated.

The Flood Group had a stand at the 2018 Hanney Michaelmas fair. Despite the wet weather it was well attended, helped to spread the word about the Flood Group and the interest generated some donations from both individuals and local organisations.

Work on the data logger is progressing with some recent work by David Price. The aim is to get the on line rainfall gauge working first and then the ultrasonic water level gauge.

There is some money in the grant for emergency equipment which had not yet been spent.

Philippa Manvell and Stella Brecknell have continued their monthly survey of invertebrate numbers in Letcombe Brook as part of a water quality monitoring initiative, the River Fly Monitoring Project. Each month they take controlled samples from set locations, as others also do along the length of the Brook, and count the various invertebrates present in the sample. The numbers and type of invertebrates present, such as Caddis Fly Larvae, are an indication of the water quality. A significant

drop in numbers might be the result of a pollution incident and trigger an investigation by the EA. This project has been running now for two years and is ongoing.

Future Plans

We will continue with the monthly working parties with extra sessions tackling Himalayan Balsam. The emergency storage shed (Hanney Hut) will be fitted with shelves and the Flood Group will move its equipment into this. A new trailer is required and the existing horse box trailer will need to be sold or disposed of. We plan to have a stand at the 2019 Michaelmas fair and Myfanwy Jones volunteered to coordinate this. The River Fly Monitoring Project will continue to be supported through monthly sampling and reporting.
